Arriving Earlier? Leaving Later? What to do?

Because the room rates are extended to three days before and three days after the reunion, many of us will be arriving early or leaving late, giving us opportunities to do things other than ride a tour bus. Following are some ideas that come to mind.

SHOPPING

It turns out that Hawaii is not only paradise for sun worshipers, but for shoppers as well. For reunion folk, the most obvious shopping choice will be the Ala Moana Shopping Center, which is adjacent to our hotel. According to Wikipedia, "Ala Moana Center, commonly known simply as Ala Moana, is the largest shopping mall in Hawaii. It is also the fifteenth largest shopping mall in the United States, and the largest open-air shopping center in the world." Not bad for a former swamp that was reclaimed with excess coral from dredging operations nearby.

While the some of the mall's original tenants, like Woolworths and Sears (both of which I frequented when stationed there) are now gone (Sears lasting until June 2013), the mall has grown steadily over its more than a half-century lifetime and now has anchor stores like Nordstrom, Neiman Marcus, and Macy's, as well as over 300 other stores, restaurants and services spread out over four floors and 2,100,000 square feet. Bloomingdale's is renovating the area previously occupied by Sears and is expected to open in 2015, so you'll have to plan a return trip if they are your thing.

Waikiki streets are lined with shops, boutiques and street vendors selling everything Hawaiian, as do



DFS Galleria and the Royal Hawaiian Center (above) shopping centers. Outside of Waikiki, shopping venues include Ward Centers and Kahala Mall in Honolulu, Pearlridge Center and the Waikele Premium Outlets in Central Oahu, and Windward Mall on the Windward Coast.

Are you looking for some shopping that is a bit out of the ordinary? Try the Aloha Flea Market. Their website, http://www.alohastadiumswapmeet.net/ says this about it: "Just 20 minutes away from Waikiki, discover unique treasures at Hawaii's largest open air flea market where the locals shop for the best deals in town.

"Open three days a week, we offer endless rows of over 400 local merchants offering the best value on imported merchandise, hand-made items, eclectic art pieces, popular local snacks, and other made in Hawaii products. This is sure to be your one stop destination to find that special gift or souvenir for everyone on your list."

The Market Place hours are: Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday, 8 AM to 3 PM, and the Swap Meet hours are Wednesday & Saturday, 8 AM to 3 PM, and Sunday, 6:30 AM to 3 PM. Admission is \$1 per buyer and children under 12 are free.

You can get to Aloha Stadium by taxi or bus. Check with the hotel for bus stops and times, or go to the bus website: http://www.thebus.org/. Driving directions are available from the Stadium website above.

DINING OUT

Finding food fast (not necessarily fast food) will be no problem with the Ala Moana Shopping Center right next door. Twenty-nine vendors, from the Ala Moana Poi Bowl to the Zagu Original Crystal and Pearl Shakes, are waiting in the fabulous Makai Market Food Court. Plus, there are ten "casual dining" restaurants (including McDonald's and Subway) and twenty more restaurants listed on the Center's webpage. And of course, Waikiki and Honolulu will have hundreds more within a ten minute walk or five minute taxi ride.



CARRENTALS:

There is no shortage of car rental companies on Oahu. If you are planning to rent a car and will be staying for a day or two extra, the weekly rate can save you hundreds. The rental rates vary widely from one company to the next, so be sure to check Price Line, Yahoo Travel, Expedia, or one of these types of web services that offers price comparisons. A quick check showed daily rates from \$33 to \$175 and weekly rates from around \$300 to \$1,500.

I even found my favorite car rental place when I was living aboard the Stoddert—that is Rent-A-Wreck. Still in business, still renting cars that look like the ones I'm used to driving.

The Beaches and Surfing


There are no less than sixteen beaches on Oahu, each with its own character. Waikiki Beach is world renowned for its long, smaller breaking waves that make it an excellent place to practice your surfing skills before taking on Ehukai Beach (a.k.a. the Banzai Pipeline) whose powerful waves break over a sharp reef, no more than a few feet from the surface. These massive tubes make this one of the most dangerous surf spots in the world and one of the venues for the Triple Crown of Surfing.

Ehukai Beach is the bad boy of the north shore beaches, which include Waimea Bay, Kawela Bay/Turtle Bay and Sunset Beach (also a Triple Crown beach). Windward (East) side beaches are Makapuu Beach, Waimanalo Beach, Lanikai Beach, Kailua Beach and Kualoa Regional Park. South Shore beaches are Waikiki, Ala Moana Beach Park/Magic Island, Hanauma Bay Nature Preserve and Sandy Beach. Ko Olina Resort and Marina, Makaha Beach and Yokohama Bay make up the Leeward (West) side beaches.

While lying around on the beach is still free, surfing is not, unless you bring your own board. Not surprisingly, there are quite a number of places available where we can rent surf boards, canoes, paddle boats, or larger motor boats to explore around the Islands. Just don't sign up for any three hour tours, unless you want to end up like Gilligan, the Skipper, the Professor, Ginger and Mary Ann.
